Report from Gage Coldwater

COLDWATER FAMILY NEWS

After several weeks on the mission, our family is really getting used to living here in Tanzania. It has been such a blessing for us to be here. We love the people here at the mission. Everyone has treated us with such love and kindness. The children are adjusting well. We have been striving to be healthier and we are trying to only eat fresh local foods like fruits and vegetables. We all love all the fresh mangoes, bananas, pineapples and other fruits. We have big bowls of them every day. I have lost around 30 pounds so far! I plan on losing another 30. Our health has been great until yesterday when Aurora came down with a minor bug. It's really neat that the Mission hospital Dr. made a house call to check her out and make sure it wasn't malaria (which it wasn't - we are on preventative!). There is a basketball court near the house and Pike loves to go down there and shoot hoops every evening with some of the local kids. Kelly and I have been going for an evening walk on the mission. The weather here is so pleasant and it is truly a luxury we enjoy. We have seen so many beautiful plants and animals along the paths. We certainly miss everyone back home in the states but we are so thankful to be here at Chimala working on the farm and preaching.

FARM EFFORT NEWS

The work on the farm project is going as planned so far. We have planted multiple gardens to a variety of vegetables that will be for feeding the preaching school students and the missionaries.

THE CATTLE PROJECT

Our major project has been clearing pastures and fence rows to install barbed wire fences as well as electric fences across the property to keep cows and goats for both meat and milk. The grass here during the rainy season is spectacular.

We have cleared about 3000 feet of fence rows (30 ft wide) of heavy brush and trees. Many of the trees here have huge thorns (like 3-inch thorns!) that really slow the progress. Most of the clearing has been done by hand with axes and machetes. We have a chainsaw but it doesn't work very well as it is in poor condition. We have hired some temporary day laborers to help hurry this along.

This week I plan on starting construction on our first pens and pastures. I am scheduled to go look later this week



at several herds of cattle and goats that we are considering purchasing to start our herds. We plan on buying around 15 cows and 1 bull as well as about 30 goats.

We plan to have chickens, ducks, pigs, rabbits, cows, sheep, goats, and fish. In order to produce our own protein for these animals, we have had to do some out-of-the-box work. One of the sources of protein will be insect-based - Black Soldier Fly Larvae. These non-biting flies are native to this area and are really amazing creatures. To put it simply, they convert waste products such as kitchen waste, animal waste, and garden waste into a high protein food source for our livestock. Isn't the creative work of God amazing! Some of the larvae of these flies have been scientifically measured for protein content and some are over

50%!!! These larvae even destroy problematic diseases like salmonella and e-coli!

CORN

Now that the rainy season has begun we plan to plant corn very soon. We will plant several plots down on the lower main mission as well as all the fire breaks on the mountain land. We are hoping to buy a small walk behind tractor that we can take to the top of the mountain and use up there for plowing. This will help make the work faster and more efficient.

CHIMALA 2018 YEAR END REPORT CARD

The proof of the pudding is in the eating, so they say. There is no way this side of eternity to know for certainty the outcome of our earthly efforts to effect spiritual change. Numbers and statistics do not always reflect the real condition of the inner man. Yet while we cannot see into people's hearts, that does not mean we should not "prove each man's work of what sort it is" (1 Cor. 3:13).

Joseph Haonga, one of the directors of the CSOP provided the following information that I find very encouraging as we consider the overall efforts of the Chimala Mission:

- Weekend evangelism 278 baptisms and 101 restorations
- Graduation report 82 baptisms
- Gospel Chariot campaigns 69 baptisms
- Radio programs 17 baptisms
- Hospital (Joshua's) report- 49 baptisms and 59 restorations
- Primary & Secondary schools 79 baptisms
- Nearby congregation reports- 319 baptisms and 103 restorations
- TOTAL= 893 baptisms and 263 restorations



This total means there were 574 baptisms and 160 restorations in 2018 as a direct result of the efforts of various departments of the Chimala Mission. And the remainder 319 baptisms and 103 restorations were achieved as a result of congregations that were originally formed by earlier efforts of those of the Chimala Mission. Of course ALL results are due to the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ! (cf. Rom. 1:16). And ALL glory belongs to Him alone.

As you consider the great amount of good that is achieved, remember that every part of the Chimala Mission is important to its overall success: CSOP, the hospital, the primary and secondary schools, the missionaries, and all the supportive roles of so many people. Every "spoke" of the wheel points to the "hub" of the mission's primary purpose for existence: "To seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10). Chimala Mission exists today because that has always been its purpose. And it will only continue to exist as long as that grand purpose remains intact. Please keep the mission in your prayers for continued harvests! Howell Ferguson
