#### This Month's Special Issue

It has been the tradition of the publication of the Chimala Mission's newsletters to produce a larger edition two or three times per year. The purpose is to give more information about the Chimala Mission's efforts overall, and also to increase the awareness of this great work on a broader scale within our brotherhood. In keeping with that good tradition, this issue is being presented. Among all the great programs of the Chimala Mission, I would like to highlight the newest project which we have already written about often: the farm program.

Progress continues to be made in the farm program at Chimala. Enthusiasm is found in the CSOP student body as they watch the labor of their own hands produce more than they could have imagined. Many of them have never seen some of the produce that they are being introduced to on the farm. And a number of them are really excelling and even selling their produce making as much as 20,000 T-shillings per week! And this is just the beginning of their harvests. Gage Coldwater has been working closely with the students while also training Ezekiel Harrison as the farm manager. This is a crucial part of the farm program as Gage and his family are leaving Chimala in mid-May.

Last month, Gage purchased a new milling machine to be used on the mission. This machine will be located on the northeast corner of the mission near the hospital. This will be an ideal location to mill rice and corn for the mission's use, but it can also be used to mill the local community's grain as well. Any

grains or vegetables produced above what is used by the mission and benevolence will be available for sale to the community, therefore helping move the mission more towards self-sufficiency. Two buildings are being constructed on this corner of the mission. One will be for the milling machine, and a building of similar size will be positioned just in front of it to serve as a store to the public.

Two hundred chickens are planned to be sold in the next month with the income going back into the farm program. The efficiency of this program is even more impressive considering that 25 percent of the feed for the chickens comes from the soldier fly larvae which are being produced in explosive multitudes. With the expansion of the farm program, the percentage of locally grown feed for the livestock will move ever closer to 100 percent. The whole philosophy behind the farm program is to operate the farm as close to 100 percent efficiency as possible using renewable resources already available at the mission. And if the pig production continues to do as well as it has, we are looking at well over 100 pigs by the end of the year, and as many as 200 plus by this time next year.

For the time being, we are financing the farm through general funds, but we are needing an additional \$1,000 per month for at least a year to give the farm time to become more productive and pay for itself. *Can you help us?*

#### Importance and Support of CSOP

The Chimala School of Preaching (CSOP) is a non-profit school that trains men and women in the Bible for a two-year degree. We currently have 21 students (2 women and 19 men) who come from all parts of Tanzania to be trained. We often have up to 35 students at a time. Our classes are taught in both Swahili and English.

When the students arrive most of them only have a small bag of clothes and nothing more. The school provides them what they need for the two years that they are attending and much of this comes from donations received from the United States. While the food is grown on the campus or obtained locally, most everything else is provided by donations. Our books, notebooks, notebook paper, pens, pencils, teaching supplies and equipment, homemade book bags, personal hygiene supplies, extra clothing, etc. have all been made possible by donations that come on the shipping containers. Without these supplies we would either have to close the school or greatly reduce the number we can train. As an illustration of our need, each year each student is given a blanket to sleep under especially when it gets cold. Without these the students would have nothing to cover themselves with since they came from home with very little. Many of these blankets are handmade by women in America and again are donated for the students to use arriving on the shipping containers. These blankets are (continued on opposite right)

#### From the Stateside Coordinator Emeritus

I still communicate with the workers at Chimala on a regular basis as many of them are close friends. I decided that I would ask each department head to send me a report regarding the progress they are making and the struggles they are facing. Today I wanted to give a short update for the Hospital, Primary School and the Secondary School.

At the hospital, Shadrack Kasiba reports that the hospital's business has been down so far this year. But I will insert that this not too unusual this time of year because of people struggling to get their farms planted and harvested. While mentioning the farming in our area, I need to let you know that Tanzania is suffering from a severe drought this year. Things started off pretty well with good rains in our area, but the Cyclone that came through Mozambique a couple of months ago seemed to affect the weather pattern for Tanzania and shut off the rainfall. There will be a severe famine in Tanzania. Please keep these people in your prayers and that enough food can be found for people to survive.

Back to the hospital; Shadrack reports that the evangelism efforts are continuing to be done on a regular basis and many souls are learning the truth, believing and being baptized for the remission of their sins.

Shadrack does report on the medical side of the hospital, that it would be a great benefit to the hospital if we could have an American Specialist to serve at the hospital. An Orthopedic doctor, an Ophthalmologist, or a specialist in diabetic care, are needed at the hospital. If there is a good Christian doctor out there that is interested in serving in the mission field, please contact Howell Ferguson for further information.

Venace Mwanjilile (the Primary School Head Teacher), reports the Primary School currently has 510 students enrolled. He wants to thank all of you that help support the orphans and the children of our preachers that are enrolled in our school. These funds are very

helpful.

As our school continues to strive to be one of the best academic schools in our part of Tanzania, Venace reminded me that we need to keep making improvements in the school. There is a big need for computers for the students to be trained on. It has gotten to the point we can buy the computers locally, so what we need are funds for computers. We need to raise \$10,000 to set up a new computer lab.

Something important to remember concerning the importance of the mission schools is this; a large portion of the students that graduate from Chimala, are not only well educated, but a large percentage of them are baptized Christians. Many of them will be future leaders in tomorrow's church.

Erhard Msanda reports the Secondary School has continued to improve the last three years in academics. Academics are the vital key to success in private schools in Tanzania. But just like the Primary School, the secondary school needs improvements also. Erhard says we need a good library at the secondary school. We need \$1,500 for shelves and \$1,800 for reference books to start a new Library. Your help will be a great benefit for the future of the school.

On a personal Note, Cyndi and I will be making what is most likely going to be our last trip to Chimala in June. It is hard to make this statement. We have been traveling to/living at Chimala for the last twenty years and it has been a big part of our lives. A part of us will always be at Chimala Mission. I will continue to work for the mission as an advisor and fund raiser until the end of the year. I want to thank each of you and our God in heaven who have made it possible for Cyndi and me to be a part of this great work.

#### Words from the Administrator

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Chimala Mission Hospital and Schools has continued to be a busy place for us. We continue to serve the Lord spiritually as our goal is to seek and save the lost (Luke 19:10). As most of you are aware that the Chimala Mission Hospital and Schools are now under the oversight of the Dalraida church of Christ eldership. The Chimala Mission has five departments: Hospital, estate, school of preaching, secondary school, and primary school. Let me give a short history of each department and what they are doing,

<u>Hospital</u>: The hospital is treating people from different areas in the Mbarali District. We have 128 beds in total, and we treat as many as 60,000 patients per

year. The main expense in running the hospital is salary and buying medicine. The hospital needs improvement in some of the following areas: Expanding the major theater (operating rooms) and mortuary. This can be improved only if we have funds, but our problem is that the government has not paying us any NHIF (Health Insurance) money for the last several months. Because of this the hospital is struggling financially. The hospital has 130 employees total.

**Estate**: The estate is a department that helps other departments to fix whatever is needed to be fixed or maintained. We have 41 employees in the es-

tate and most of them are the guards. Other than the guards, we have a plumber, two carpenters, an electrician, and two mechanics. The salary for all of the estate employees come from supporters in America.

Preaching School: CSOP (Chimala School of Preaching) is our school for training men to become preachers. We have 21 students all in their second year of schooling. In the Swahili program we have 13 students and in the English degree program we have 8 students. The students are in class during the week and

on the weekends they are our doing evangelistic work with the area congregations. When they come back to school in July they will be involved with the Gospel Chariot as it is working with 5 different

congregations. The preaching school is also totally dependent upon funds for support from America, but we are hoping to change some of that through the farming project.

Secondary School: The secondary school has 130 students from Form I to Form IV. We have 17 staff (teachers and support staff). Use are using school fees to run the secondary school. The main challenge in the secondary school is that the parents are not paying their children's fees on time. Bible knowledge is always taught in our classrooms, and some of the students have obeyed the gospel and become followers of Christ. Most of the



fees we collect goes to pay salary and purchasing food for the students.

Primary School: The primary school has 520 students from nursery to grade 7. They have 24 staff (teachers and support staff). The primary school is experiencing the same challenges as the secondary school in that parents are not paying their fees on time. In the primary school all the fees also go to pay for the salaries and food.

Farm Project: In January we started the farm project for the purpose of suppling food for the mission as well as helping us to become self-supporting. We thank brother Gage Coldwater who is voluntari-

ly working on this project. The farm is raising chicken, rabbits, pigs, and gardens. The reason for these projects is that our goal is to make the mission selfsupporting.

Finally, let me say your generous support will help us improve the Chimala Mission Hospital and Schools. May God continue to bless you in your efforts, and we ask you to pray for God's blessings upon us here in Chimala, Tanzania,

A: That is a very good question. And the answer to that question is one that is having to be learned more about in my first year serving as Chimala Mission's stateside coordinator.

Whenever we receive medicines or medical supplies, we must remember that it might be a year before we ship another container. # Principles for Chimala Leadership Success (2)

I once read that that there were four qualities necessary for successful leadership: the ability to listen, to encourage, to articulate, and to demonstrate. A human character flaw we all share in common is the tendency to respond or react before all the information is known. Many roadblocks in Tanzanian culture could more easily be overcome by heeding the wisdom of careful listening especially to older people. Tanzanians have a much greater respect for older people than many in our western culture. Trying to assert one's intelligence, quick wit, or intimidating presence will seldom touch the heart or bend the will of a stubborn village patriarch. Respectful and courteous listening, however, will have a much greater chance of opening otherwise closed doors thought otherwise impossible to budge.

This is not merely the Tanzanian way, but rather it is the practice of effective leadership universally. The Bible says that "A wise man will hear and increase learning, And a man of understanding will attain wise counsel" (Proverbs 1:5). James wrote, "let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath" (James 1:19). It is interesting that the early followers of Jesus were called "disciples", meaning "learners." Even the purpose and power of the Holy Spirit that would later come upon Jesus's disciples (John 14:26), was to a large extent to remind them of what they had heard while listening to Jesus. Teaching effective leadership to the Tanzanians must first be practiced by us with good listening.

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Come and see yourself and get involved in the good works at Chimala.

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# Please Help Us Offset Shipping Container Costs

The Chimala Mission has always been committed to operating as efficiently as possible. Every dollar, quarter, dime, nickel, or penny represents individual Christians who put the mission's interest above their own. We have never lost sight of that, and we never will.

One area that has recently gained our attention is our tax exemption Tanzanian status before the government. We are working very hard to resolve the matter locally and in Tanzania. Without going into the political reasons, it is sufficient to say that right now we are being hit hard on taxes. On our last container, we were charged \$5,775 in taxes! That put a large burden on the mission budget that we earnestly need to recover from.



We cannot, however, afford not to send these valuable containers for a number of reasons. One, as a mission operating in an African country, we are always in need of various supplies or equipment that simply cannot be bought Tanzania. And even those items that are available are generally more than double the price. Two, inside these containers is the space and weight capacity to ship supplies in huge numbers making it actually a very economical way to keep the mission operating even when certain items are scarce locally. Three, the

containers we ship give churches Christians and individual opportunity to personally help the Tanzanian people by supplying the needs of missionaries, students, newborn babies and their mothers, orphans and widows. There are few appreciated more homemade student bags, quilts, receiving blankets and newborn caps. You should see students' eyes light up when they peek into their bags to see American crayons and color pencils.

Besides all of these, there are larger equipment pieces for the estate and replacement parts that are hard to find locally. But finally, these containers shipped tax-free send a strong message to the Tanzanian government and its people that the mission efforts of the churches of

Christ are not for profit or prosperity. The people who provide the contents of these containers are a giving people. That is a message that we must never cease to spread. And the heart and spirit behind that benevolence is none other than our Lord and

Savior Jesus Christ.

We will continually juggle the feasibility of shipping containers to Tanzania. When it is economical to purchase items there; that is what we will do. But the benefit of shipping occasional containers of both mission supplies and humanitarian aid continues to be overwhelmingly significant. We could truly use your help. While we work to resolve the tax issue. can vou help us offset this loss of \$5,775?
