


a year he will need a second operation followed eventually by a third operation.

CSOP Harvest of Souls

Typically at this time of year the Chimala Mission is in the middle of campaigns, seminars and visiting nursing students. But due to the strange mixture of medicine, politics, and senseless riots all of Chimala's normal summer events have been cancelled—at least for Americans. Nevertheless, CSOP has not lost it's focus and is busier than ever on the soul-winning trail! Here is a summary of Frank's recent reports:

First & second groups led by Frank and Remy with 6 students at the Mlangali A and Mlangali B churches of Christ. Work involved going house to house, encouraged unfaithful Christians, supplied Bible lessons, tracts and prayed with the people. Results: 120 Bible studies, 290 tracts, 2 baptisms, 2 restorations. Sunday attendance: 38 adults and 26 children.



Third group led by Lai Mkwama with 3 students at Luhovelo Church of Christ. Work involved going house to house, visiting unfaithful Christians. Results: 50 Bible lessons, 160 tracts, 1 baptism, 3 restorations. Sunday attendance was 35 adults and 17 children.

Fourth group led by Bernard Kulanga with 3 students at Mfumbi Church of Christ. Work involved going house to house, encouraging unfaithful Christians, supplying Bible materials. Results: 36 Bible lessons, 2 restorations. Sunday attendance was 37 adults and 22 children.

Fifth and sixth groups led by Alphonce and Boaz with 5 students at the Mapangala Church of Christ. Work involved going house to house, visiting unfaithful Christians, supply Bible materials. Results: 2 restorations, 37 Bible lessons, 94 tracts. Sunday attendance was 18 adults and 16 children.

The totals were 128 adults, 81 children, 3 baptisms, 6 restorations, 243 Bible studies, 544 tracts. God is good!

The next morning Bob helped me load the boxes in my truck even though he is not able to see as well as he once did. The Ebers are encouraging demonstrations of the fact that age and health seldom keep God's people from important acts of service and kindness. The Chimala Mission thrives today due to the "fruit of the Spirit" regularly identified by your love and support of this important work in the Kingdom of God in Tanzania!

Farm Harvest and Update

The Chimala Mission farm program began officially January 2019. Most Tanzanians already knew how to farm; however there was room for improvement. We knew at the beginning of this project that we would not produce actual positive income greater than operating costs for some time. Much of the tillable land (especially at Ailsa) had not been farmed in many years. And the back section of the main mission property had never been pastured to my knowledge. Fencing has been put up, but we are not far enough along to graze a significant amount of cattle yet. Nevertheless, we are

making progress and beginning to create income thus moving in the direction of the goal of making the Chimala Mission self-sustaining.

The following information has been provided by Ezekiel Mwambogolo who has just reported back following the harvest of most of the corn and beans at Ailsa. One of the challenges of the farm program is the 3,500 feet elevation separation of both parts of the mission. Instead of wearing out equipment moving up and down the mountain we now have at least the basic equipment to operate

both tracts of land. Thanks to a donation from former Chimala missionary Richard Rogers (THANK YOU!!), we now own a used 3-disc turning plough for the Ailsa farm (rather than renting one). Here are highlights some from Ezekiel's report:

- The number of pigs has increased from 103 in January to 130.
- There are currently more than 20 pregnant sows.
- Some pigs have been donated for food to CSOP.
- Goats have increased from 18 to 27 (lost some to snakebites).
- There are 9 cows; expecting 2 calves by next year.
- We started last year with 13 ducks but now have 30 ducks with 50 eggs expecting to hatch soon.
- The 3 acres of corn planted on lower mission produced 31 bags (each bag contains 10 10's or 100kgs or 220lbs).
- The 15 acres of corn planted at Ailsa produced 65 bags.
- The total of corn was 96 bags—less than we had hoped.
- The 14 acres of beans planted at Ailsa produced 22 bags.
- Currently vegetables are being sold to the primary and secondary schools for half price.
- The mill earned 650,000 Tsh in July, and we are milling our own corn and rice for free.

A few comments are in order. To begin with, we are learning valuable experience from our corn and bean harvest. Due to the higher altitude and lower temperatures, we may need to research for a more suitable seed for corn next season. This is especially important for a couple of reasons: 1) We intend to plant a much larger amount of land at Ailsa in both corn and beans to produce a greater yield; and 2) To appease the TZ government that has been pressing us to further develop the land. Another point to be made is the slow but long-term benefit from cows. Rotating cattle in our large tracts of land should make this very sustainable. Finally, we are continuing to improve present projects and explore other crops, livestock, fish, water systems, bees, etc. Whatever is able to thrive, create and sustain income for the mission is of interest to us.
